HOLY FAMILY LIFE

Words of Wisdom The Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World

Coming up this fall, we will have the 30th anniversary of the brilliant Apostolic Exhortation by Blessed Pope John Paul II, given to the world on 22 November 1981, "Familiaris Consortio," or The Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World.

The following is a summary, in my words, of this inspiring document, but let's begin with a statement that cuts to the very heart of the matter:

"The future of the World and of the Church passes through the Family."

Blessed Pope John Paul II (FC,75)

The communion of love between God and His people finds its meaning in the marriage covenant between a man and a woman. Virginity or celibacy for the sake of the Kingdom of God does not contradict the dignity of marriage, but presupposes and confirms it. When marriage is not esteemed, consecrated virginity cannot exist. When human sexuality is not regarded as



a great value given by the Creator, the renunciation of it for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven loses its meaning.

The gift of the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Marriage is a commandment of life for Christian

spouses. They are called to progress towards an ever richer and indissoluble union with each other at all levels, revealing to the Church and the world the new communion of love given by the grace of Jesus Christ. They are called to holiness. Such a sacred communion is radically contradicted by homosexual unions and all other strange manipulations of marriage.

In creating the human race as male and female, God gives men and women an equal personal dignity. God manifests the dignity of women in the highest form possible by assuming human flesh, as Jesus Christ, from the Virgin Mary, whom the Church honors as the Mother of God, calling her the New Eve, and

presenting her as the model of all redeemed women.

Unfortunately, the Christian message about the dignity of women is contradicted by a persistent secular mentality that considers the human being not as a person, but as a thing. This produces very bitter and degrading fruits, especially made evident in pornography, slavery, and prostitution.

Authentic conjugal love presupposes and requires that a man has a profound respect for the equal dignity of his wife. Loving his wife as the mother of his children, and loving his children themselves, a man finds the natural way of understanding and fulfilling his own fatherhood, which is the very fatherhood of God. Concern for children, from the very first moment of conception, is the primary and fundamental test of the relationship of one civilized human being to another. As life progresses, the elderly help to clarify a scale of human values, showing the continuity of generations and marvelously demonstrating the interdependence of God's people. As already described by the Early Church, the family is the "domestic church." It is the first school of virtues and Faith needed by society.

The Church stands for life, and, fortunately for the world, it does! It is gravely unjust and immoral, in international relations, for example, where economic help for the advancement of people is made

conditional on the acceptance of programs of promiscuous sex education, artificial contraception, sterilization, and abortion.

The family must be protected because it is the building block of society, the very foundation of society. If the family does not have moral integrity, the world will not have moral integrity. Families should be the first to take steps to see that the laws and institutions of the state do not offend, but support and positively defend the rights and duties of the family.

Christian families offer a special contribution to the missionary cause of the Church by fostering vocations among their sons and daughters. By leading holy lives in every place, and in every circumstance, families help to consecrate the world itself to God. To this end, the Eucharist – the very Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ – is the source and summit of Christian life.

mal decree:

"I declare with moral certainty, and in accord with the norms of the Church, that the events, apparitions, and locutions given to Adele

apparitions that occurred in 1859 on the site of the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help in Champion, Wisconsin. The task of the commission was to rigorously test the historical apparitions in light of the Church's teaching on Public Revelation.

On 8 December 2010, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Bishop Ricken issued a for-

Brise in October of 1859 do exhibit the substance of supernatural character, and I do hereby approve these apparitions as worthy of belief (although not obligatory) by the Christian faithful."¹

Our Blessed Mother appeared to 28-year-old Adele Joseph Brise in 1859 and told her:

"I am the Queen of Heaven [...] Gather the children in this wild country and teach them what they should know for salvation [...] Teach them their catechism, how to sign themselves with the Sign of the Cross, and how to approach the sacraments; that is what I wish you to do. Go and fear nothing. I will help you."²

By 1864, Adele had gathered a group of women who lived together in communal life, and they founded St. Mary's Boarding Academy. Until her death in 1896, Adele devoted herself to fulfilling the mission given to her by Our Blessed Mother. Although she was called "Sister," Adele was actually a member of a secular third order following the Franciscan way of life.³

A PROFILE OF SERVICE

Well Done, Good and Faithful Servant

Father Eugene Ronan, M.S.F. 13 January 1941 – 28 March 2011

Fortified with the Sacraments of Holy Mother Church, Father Gene Ronan, M.S.F. died on 28 March 2011.

Dearest son of the late Joseph A. and Margaret (Bonner) Ronan, Father Gene had

two brothers, Joe and Bill, who preceded him in death. He is survived by his sisters, Rosemary and Patricia, five nieces and two nephews, and by his dear confreres of the Priests and Brothers of the Missionaries of the Holy Family.

Father Gene, 70, was a native of Altoona, Pennsylvania. He was a vowed member of the Missionaries of the Holy Family for 21 years and ordained a priest for 17 years. He attended school in Altoona, and, after graduating, he worked at several different occupations. Eventually, he answered his call to the religious life and entered the



Missionaries of the Holy Family. His first vows were taken on 15 August 1989, and he was ordained a priest in Altoona on 18 September 1993.

Father Gene

served as Parochial Vicar (PV) of Holy Family Church in New Braunfels, Texas; PV at St. Wenceslaus Church in St. Louis, Missouri; Chaplain at the Little Sisters of the Poor in St. Louis; PV at Holy Family Church in Edinburg, Texas; Pastor of St. James Church in Beeville, Texas; and, most recently, as Pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church in New Braunfels.

Father Gene was active in the Knights of Columbus in New Braunfels, and he was their strong Pro-Life voice in the community. He was the leader in developing a monthly Knights of Columbus Pro-Life Mass.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May his soul, and the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Men of God






Without the Priesthood of Jesus Christ, there would be no Eucharist. Can you imagine our world without the Eucharist?!

Throughout the day on Saturday, we played games, listened to speakers talk about different parts of our Faith, met in our small groups to talk, and wrote extensively in our journals. The topic that impacted me the most was giving everything to God. I now know to give Him all

of my worries, sorrows, and even my happiness. After that talk, we wrote letters to anyone we wanted to, and we nailed them to a cross. Everyone was very emotional and loving and forgiving during that time. When we were all finished, each person took someone else's letter from the cross, and, without reading it, burned the letter. We finished the day with Eucharistic Adoration, and we read letters sent to us from our family and friends. It was an exhausting but excellent day.

After another night at the "sleep house," we went back for one final

talk and a morning scavenger hunt. Then we went to church where all of our families were waiting. We got to sing the songs we learned and share our experiences with our parents. We all left the retreat feeling closer to each other and to God. I would highly recommend this retreat to any teen. I really didn't think I would like it, but, it was fun, and I learned a lot about myself, my Faith, and my relationship with God. Discipline has Taken a Spanking

Discipline – A word that once had a pretty good reputation. Parents instinctively knew that discipline was something kids needed. It was good for them. It taught them the basics of living – character, mor-

responsibility, respect. But in the last generation or two, discipline has taken a spanking. Experts proclaim that really savvy shouldn't parents have to discipline much. They can talk and reason children into cooperating. The media bombard parents with all the latest theories on psychologi-

cal correctness. And the culture relentlessly echoes the attitude that words like authority, limits, and control are old-fashioned concepts we need to throw off.

No matter what trendy notions permeate parenting today, reality always wins. Discipline still is critical to character. It still is a loving, durable gift that lasts a lifetime. And, it still is something parents

instinctively know is good for their children.


Nevertheless, even the best of parents are confused. Indeed, no area of child rearing causes more

day-to-day uncertainty, guilt, and frustration than discipline. Are my expectations too high? Am I too strict? Too lax? When should I discipline? Where? How much? What if I'm wrong? How can I get my kids to listen? Is their behavior normal?

Why am I so sure that discipline is a top concern

among parents today? The sheer numbers. The great majority of people who attend my seminars are seeking discipline guidance. Most of my clients come to me out of frustration. They are not enjoying their kids as they had hoped because the kids' behavior is so unruly. Indeed, 90 percent of what parents ask of me concerns disci-





are straightforward and easy for you to use. Similar techniques can work for a wide range of problems.

 And, most important, parenthood is God-designed to be enjoyed.

We're all in this together. We share the same worries and frustrations. Let's lighten up, laugh more, and love our children enough to do what's best for them, and for us, too.

3rd Annual Altar Server Jamboree

Approximately 50 altar servers assembled at the Knights of Columbus Hall in New Braunfels, Texas, on Saturday, 7 May 2011, at 9:00 a.m. for the 3rd Annual Altar Servers Jamboree. The event is sponsored annually by Holy Family Church in New Braunfels, and, this year, three other parishes joined in the celebration: St. Dominic in San Antonio, St. Ann in La Vernia, and St. Joseph's Mission in Redwood.

Two Sisters of the Holy Spirit & Mary Immaculate, Sisters Gabriel Hession and Eugenius Gallaher, also attended and presented a view of the life of a religious sister. Missionaries of the Holy Family priests, Fr. Mario Galindo, M.S.F. and Fr. Ignatius "Feddy" Himawan, M.S.F., spoke to the young men about vocations.

The guest speaker was Bishop Oscar Cantu, Auxiliary Bishop of San Antonio. He spoke of the awesomeness of the Mass – the most wonderful event that ever takes place where we witness Jesus Christ becoming present on the altar. He stressed to the altar servers that they have the opportunity to assist in this wonderful event when they serve at Mass. He explained that Jesus gave us the formula for becoming great and Blessed Pope John Paul Il also taught that formula, which is TO SERVE, and then he challenged these young teenagers TO SERVE.

Bishop Cantu went on to explain the difference between "our plan for the future" and "God's plan." As soon as we are born, God has a plan for us. In order to discover God's plan, we need to spend time in prayer, communicating with and listening to Him in our hearts, so that we can follow His plan rather than our own

We should also listen to the people of wisdom in our lives – our parents, teachers, priests, and religious sisters – with whom we come into contact. Many times these people see in us what we do not see in ourselves; we should listen to people who love us because they are the ones who really care about us.

Bishop Cantu explained the difference between pleasure and happiness. Pleasure is a temporary experience we derive from something we desire, for example, a pizza. Happiness comes from following

God's plan. He used the analogy of a mother getting up during the night to attend to her baby. While this may not give her pleasure, it is an expression of her happiness in caring for her child.

Bishop Cantu explained that God gives us happiness because God is love. Love inspires us to make sacrifices. Relating his ambition as a youth to becoming a musician, he borrowed a guitar and played a song while leading the audience in the singing of "Yo te amo mucho."

Fr. Mario Galindo, M.S.F. and Dora Huerta, Holy Family Church's Altar Server Coordinator, then presented Bishop Cantu with a beautiful Crystal Cross as an expression of gratitude.

The Congregation of the Missionaries of the Holy Family (MSF) was founded in 1895 by Fr. John Berthier, a French priest of the La Salette Order. From the very beginning, the Holy Family missionaries felt called to minister to families in a special way. This great work

continues to the present day.

The Missionaries of the Holy Family also work with lay people who support the missionaries with their prayers and good works. These lay people are called the "Friends of the Holy Family."

In many respects, these "Friends" are like Third Orders associated with the Franciscans, Carmelites, and Dominicans. The Friends of the Holy Family pray regularly for the needs of our Congregation, such as the need for new vocations, adequate financial resources, and effectiveness in preaching the Gospel.

There is a poem called *A Legend* by Adelaide Proctor. It is about a



preacher whose sermons attracted large crowds from near and far. During all of these sermons, there was an old man in the background quietly praying his Rosary. One day, the preacher was thanking God for his gift of preaching that drew so many people

and seemed to change their lives. Imagine his surprise when a voice from within told him that it was not his sermons, but the prayers of the old man praying the Rosary, which touched and changed people's hearts.

The Friends are also encouraged to perform good works on behalf of the Congregation, such as visiting the sick, or volunteering in a soup kitchen or food pantry. The Friends, like the Missionaries themselves, are concerned with the pastoral care of families, especially in parishes served by the Holy Family priests and brothers.

There is no doubt that the American family today is in crisis. Everywhere

we look there are grievous problems: widespread divorce, declining birth rates, children with no religious training, couples living together, drug addiction,

family discord, etc.

Many worldly solutions to the family crisis have been tried, but none of them had any more than a ripple effect. There is, however, one thing that can truly work miracles in our families. and that one thing is the power of prayer.

The British poet Tennyson wrote, things "More are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of."

Matthew 9:37 The late Jean Vanier once said, "Some of the greatest movements for good in the history of the world have been brought about by the quiet prayers of totally

unknown people."

And St. Paul tells us, "Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7)
